



## **About Tadamon**

#### Making CSOs Stronger

The IsDB - ISFD NGO Empowerment for Poverty Reduction Program (Tadamon) is a partnership program sponsored by the Islamic Solidarity Fund for Development (ISFD), managed and designed by the Islamic Development Bank (IsDB), and implemented by the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP). This booklet demonstrates how this initiative has evolved from providing visibility to Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) projects and activities to facilitating and supporting innovative ideas that have the potential to scale up in those Member Countries (MCs) of the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC)

that have endorsed the Program.

The program is being implemented during the years 2019-2024 among the 57 OCI member countries. Each year, around 7 priority countries are selected for the implementation of the program. Within the scope of the program, over 100 CSOs are empowered annually. The goal of this booklet is to illustrate the activities and achievements of the IsDB-ISFD NGO Empowerment Program for Poverty Reduction in Brunei Darussalam.





## Civil Society in Brunei Darussalam

Since gaining independence in 1984, Brunei Darussalam's civil society organizations (CSOs) have evolved from being dominated by legacy groups from the British Protectorate era to more diverse, youth-driven initiatives. Over the past two decades, CSOs have played an increasingly active role, particularly during the COVID-19 pandemic, in addressing social, environmental, and developmental challenges.

Brunei's CSO landscape includes registered NGOs, community and religious organizations, and volunteer groups. As of today, there are 545 registered organizations under the Societies Order 2005. These groups focus on key areas such as education, health, youth empowerment, environmental conservation, and social welfare, reflecting Brunei's commitment to social harmony and inclusiveness.

His Majesty Sultan Haji Hassanal Bolkiah has consistently emphasized the vital role of CSOs in national development, urging collaboration with the government to strengthen Brunei's social fabric.

In alignment with Brunei Vision 2035 and the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), CSOs actively partner with government agencies in initiatives like environmental conservation, youth programs, and public health campaigns.

Despite government support through funding and capacity-building programs, challenges remain, particularly in volunteer retention and financial sustainability. While grants are available, they are limited, making it difficult for newly established CSOs to secure resources. Exploring social enterprise models could provide long-term funding solutions.


Strengthening Brunei's civil society requires improved networking among NGOs, capacity-building initiatives, and stronger partnerships with the government. As youth-led initiatives and environmental advocacy gain momentum, continued collaboration and public engagement will be key to shaping a more impactful and sustainable civil society.



## Mapping of CSOs

Since 2020, the program has mapped, categorised and surveyed the civil society landscape across 33 CIO member countries. In 2022 this mapping was conducted in Brunei Darussalam to understand better and get to know the people and organisations at the forefront of grassroots development. Instead of relying on existing databases and directories, a new approach was specifically designed to have CSOs come to our platform. The goal was to identify the most active organisations that would benefit from the program and its activities, by having CSOs sign up on the Tadamon platform.

After signing up and passing our three-step verification process, CSOs gain access to participate in our activities: grant programs, financed by IsDB, Crowdfunding Academies and other forthcoming capacity-building programs.

- 1. CSOs' activities are in line with IsDB's areas of interventions;
- 2. CSOs have no political affiliation
- 3. CSOs have a minimum of 2 years of experience
- 4. CSOs are registered and licensed to operate in their respective countries




# CSOs in Brunei Darussalam



#### Fields of activities of mapped CSOs




#### **Reasons for joining Tadamon**




#### **Experience with Crowdfunding**






