

### **About Tadamon**

#### Making CSOs Stronger

The IsDB - ISFD NGO Empowerment for Poverty Reduction Program (Tadamon) is a partnership program sponsored by the Islamic Solidarity Fund for Development (ISFD), managed and designed by the Islamic Development Bank (IsDB), and implemented by the United Nations Development Program (UNDP). This booklet demonstrates how this initiative has evolved from providing visibility to Civil Society Organizations' (CSOs) projects and activities to facilitating and supporting innovative ideas that have potential to scale up in those Member Countries (MCs) of the Organization

of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) that have endorsed the Program.

The program is being implemented during the years 2019-2024 among the 57 OIC member countries. Each year, around 7 priority countries are selected for the implementation of the program. Within the scope of the program, over 100 CSOs are empowered annually. The goal of this booklet is to illustrate the activities and achievements of the IsDB-ISFD NGO Empowerment Program for Poverty Reduction in Libya.





- Serve as the "Trip advisor" on CSOs programs and projects in particular fields, in order to make it easier for citizens, the private sector, and philanthropies to financially support the humanitarian and development efforts of CSOs.



## Civil Society in Libya

The state of civil society organizations in Libya reflects their crucial role in filling gaps in service provision, particularly in the midst of wars, economic challenges, and the limited capacity of governments to meet the population's needs. These organizations have stepped up to provide various services, including health, education, humanitarian aid, social support, economic initiatives, and environmental efforts. They have also played an active role in assisting displaced individuals and undocumented immigrants, offering relief and assistance.

In addition to their service-oriented activities, civil society organizations have been actively involved in supporting electoral processes and collaborating with the High National Elections Commission. Around 1,200 civil activists have participated in monitoring elections throughout Libya, underscoring their commitment to democratic processes and governance.

International organizations, including those affiliated with the United Nations such as the International Organization for Migration and the United Nations Development Program, have relied heavily on Libyan civil society organizations to improve the humanitarian situation in the country. These partnerships have been instrumental in delivering health services, relief aid,

awareness campaigns, and educational programs, particularly in regions located far from the capital. Furthermore, Libyan civil society organizations have collaborated with local authorities, such as the Libyan Relief and Humanitarian Aid Authority and municipal councils, to address the deteriorating humanitarian conditions in affected cities and regions.

The type of services provided by civil society organizations often depends on the priorities and agendas of donors. Demand for specific services can fluctuate based on donor preferences, leading to changes in organizational priorities. For example, there has been an increased demand for social services since mid-2014, while charitable and humanitarian services witnessed a surge in 2017. However, this dynamic nature of service provision can subject civil society organizations to criticism, particularly during times of conflict and war.

To conclude, civil society organizations in Libya play a vital role in addressing societal needs, promoting democratic processes, and collaborating with international partners. Their efforts contribute to filling service gaps, supporting vulnerable populations, and striving for social and economic development in the country.





## Mapping of CSOs

Since 2020, the program has mapped, categorised and surveyed the civil society landscape across 33 OIC member countries. In 2021 this mapping was conducted in Somalia in order to better understand and get to know the people and organizations at the forefront of grassroots development.

Instead of relying on existing databases and directories, a new approach was specifically designed to have CSOs come to our platform. The goal was to identify the most active organizations that would benefit from the program and its activities, by having CSOs sign up on the Tadamon platform.

After signing up and passing our three-step verification process, CSOs gain access to participate in our activities: grant programs, financed by IsDB, Crowdfunding Academies and other forthcoming capacity building programs.




## CSOs in Iraq


Below is a visualisation of selected data points included in the sign-up form.



#### **Activity level**




#### Fields of activities of mapped CSOs




#### **Reasons for joining Tadamon**




#### **Experience with Crowdfunding**




Whether or not mapped CSOs have received previous funding from UNDP or ISDB



#### How organizations found out about Tadamon




#### SDGs that best describe the activities of mapped CSOs



## **Tadamon Countries**

As a result of CSO mapping, TADAMON now has a searchable database of over 3419 CSOs categorized by a number of variables. In this way, interested partners can search for organizations working on specific development challenges.

In 2020 we started with six pilot countries, in which to test our approach and refine our services. Each year we are expanding our network to new OIC member countries that have endorsed the Tadamon program.
